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# **BAYADA Recognizes Two Pediatric Nurses as National Heroes of the Year**

On Saturday, June 3, BAYADA's four National Heroes of the Year took the stage in front of more than 2,300 employees at the annual Awards Weekend in Philadelphia to humbly accept their well-deserved recognition from BAYADA President and Founder Mark Baiada and BAYADA Director Ann Baiada.

Established in 1999, the Hero Program recognizes care professionals who consistently demonstrate the BAYADA core values of compassion, excellence, and reliability. Each quarter, clients and peers nominate their local heroes. From the local heroes, division heroes are selected and ultimately four national heroes are chosen from among the following disciplines: registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, therapist, home health aide, certified nursing assistant, and social worker.

Helping a child with a rare disease be a normal little boy

Like many little boys his age, BAYADA client **Austin**, 6, loves playing with matchbox cars, something his nurse Rachel uses to her advantage in his care.

"Austin has weakened muscles due to myopathy, a disease in which the

muscle fibers do not function properly. Because of this, he has trouble with weight-bearing activities such as standing. When he is not weight-bearing, the calcium in his bones is affected, which can make the bones brittle and break easier," explains Rachel. "To keep his bones strong, he uses a stander, which helps him get from a sitting to a standing position. The trouble is, some days he's not really up for the stander so I have to be creative to get him motivated."

To encourage Austin to get into his stander, she uses the promise of matchbox cars, lots of matchbox cars! "We do water play and we scrub the matchbox cars and put them through car washes," she shares. "Sometimes he doesn't want to come out of the stander because he is having so much fun. That's when I know I've done my job!"

Austin looks forward to Rachel's visits, and he has grown to love her as much as she loves him. "He is just charming. He's got great tenacity and courage, he is just a love," she says.

Love and patience leads to progress for a boy with a traumatic brain injury

Sam Dollyhigh will never forget the moment he found out his wife Laura and their two sons Jack. 8. and **Archer**. 3 were in a serious car accident. "I was in absolute shock," he said. "I know things like this happen in the world, but you are

never prepared for them."

While Jack came through the ordeal with only a broken leg, Laura and Archer had both sustained severe traumatic brain injuries and were fighting for their lives. With the help of family and friends to take care of Jack, Sam set up residence at the hospital, and didn't go home until six months later when Laura was transferred to a long-term care facility and Archer was ready for discharge.

"When they told me I was going to take him home, I was petrified," shares Sam. "Archer couldn't sit, he couldn't stand or walk, he couldn't hold anything, couldn't pick anything up, and he was tube fed. I just didn't know how I was going to take care of him."

Fortunately, BAYADA Nurse Cathy Medeiros came into their lives.

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For Austin's parents Randi and James Cook, watching their son's face light up with joy is something they never thought possible.

"I am worry-free when Rachel is with him," says Randi. "She doesn't treat him like a child with low muscle tone and a ventilator, but like a normal child. Rachel would jump through hoops for my son. She is a hero for my family. Rachel, thank you for everything you do. We would be so lost without you. We love you."

For Rachel, learning she had been named as the RN Hero of the Year was one of the most humbling experiences of her life. "The letters that the families wrote just touched my soul," she says. "To be recognized to that magnitude is just beautiful."

Reflecting on her 18-year career with BAYADA, Rachel wouldn't trade it for the world. "I have cared for little ones who jump in your lap and they tell you that they love you and you can see it in their eyes how much you mean to them, and it's just heartwarming," she says. "I can make a difference. I can keep a child at home. I can help them go to school. I truly love what I do."

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and wrestling with his father. "Nobody knows how to take care of Archer as much as Cathy does, including me," says Sam. "She helps us in so many ways. There is nobody that I would trust as much as Cathy to watch my son while I'm at work. We're just really, really lucky that we found her because if it wasn't for her, I really don't know where we would be."

"When Archer first came home he would sit in his little chair and just stare," shares Cathy, who remembers the day when he started to make real progress. "I started singing the song *Five Little Monkeys* to him and he started kind of bouncing like he was jumping like the monkeys in the song who jump on the bed. That was exciting!"

Moments like these are common with Archer, thanks to Cathy's persistence. She also hopes to teach him to swallow so that he can be weaned off the feeding tube. Small victories, such as swallowing a spoonful of water, are cause for celebration, as are Archer's efforts to walk to the park instead of riding in his stroller, or his attempts at tasks that improve his dexterity, like picking up a cookie and putting it into a jar. Archer is even able to attend school, thanks to Cathy's one-on-one care in the classroom.

"What makes Cathy special is the way she works with Archer, always encouraging him to face new challenges," says Sam. "She is a hero because of how much she cares."

Cathy found it hard to believe that she had been named LPN Hero of the Year and got to travel to Philadelphia to meet BAYADA President and Founder **Mark Baiada**. "I just do the job that I love to do," she says. "Knowing that I'm making a difference in another's life, that pretty much makes my day."

## **BAYADA Pediatrics Renews Partnership with Cure SMA**

National sponsorship comes as new drug shows promise for treatment

BAYADA Pediatrics is proud to announce its sixth year of partnership as a national sponsor of Cure SMA. The non-profit organization is dedicated to supporting families affected by spinal muscular atrophy (SMA) and funding research for new treatments and, eventually, a cure.

According to Cure SMA President Kenneth Hobby, over three decades of research have led to a better understanding of the SMA disease process, but have not yielded effective treatment options, until now. In clinical trials, patients treated with a drug called SPINRAZA<sup>TM</sup> experienced meaningful improvement in motor function compared to untreated study participants. Based on the successful clinical trials, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved SPINRAZA as a treatment for SMA in pediatric and adult patients.

"The recent approval of SPINRAZA as the first therapy ever for SMA has launched our community into a new stage of treatment and care," says Kenneth. "As the new drug shows promise for increased survival rates and improved motor function, care will evolve from treating SMA as a terminal illness to treating it as a chronic disease. As our patients live longer it will be even more important for them to have quality nursing care at home to help them manage their condition. That's why we are delighted to have BAYADA back for a sixth year of partnership, and we are grateful for their support of the SMA community."


### It's so nice to have hope

BAYADA Transitional Care Manager **Susie Ecker**, RN, has seen, firsthand, how SPINRAZA has made an incredible impact on an infant with SMA. She is working to transition the baby home from Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) with the help of BAYADA's Philadelphia Pediatrics office, where

BAYADA Clinical Manager **Gina Carboni** will oversee his care.

"After receiving SPINRAZA, the baby is doing really well," says Susie. "He is kicking, grabbing at toys, putting his hands in his mouth, and has good head control, which is not typical of babies with SMA. It's like a miracle. It's so nice to have hope."

SPINRAZA will be a key topic of discussion at the Cure SMA Annual Conference held in Orlando, FL this summer. As a national Cure SMA sponsor, BAYADA clinicians have the opportunity to participate in the conference, which attracts world-renowned scientists and researchers from across the globe. Both Susie and Gina will be in attendance.



Sharing clinical information has been the cornerstone of BAYADA's six year relationship with Cure SMA. In addition to the national conference, clinicians from both organizations have developed training programs to ensure nurses are providing the most advanced care possible to children with the disease.

From the basketball court to the state house: Parents advocate for the special needs community



High school student **Gabe DaCosta**'s mom watches from the sidelines of the gymnasium during most basketball games as her son slaps hands with each of the starting players. Gabe loves basketball and helps his dad, head coach **Tony DaCosta**, motivate the team by giving them "five" as they head onto the court.

Gabe was diagnosed with cerebral palsy shortly after his birth and was in the hospital until he was five months old. Today he is in 10th grade and is non-ambulatory and non-verbal. However, the use of an iPad has been instrumental in his ability to communicate with his dad, his mom **Savine DaCosta**, and at school. Although Gabe and his family have overcome many challenges, they have a positive outlook. Gabe has an infectious smile and a warm personality that helps to inspire so many others. His parents have raised him to see that his disability is something unique about him and that he has much to share with his classmates and all who are in his presence.

Although Tony and Savine both work outside the home in addition to raising their son, Savine also has volunteered to try to find ways to help other families caring for loved ones with special medical needs. As a home care client of BAYADA, Gabe and his family have attended lobby days in Harrisburg and Savine has been a keynote speaker advocating for legislators to stand up for people with special medical needs. In addition, Savine also advocates for people who are non-verbal and who are unsure what support might be available to them as she works to help these families find technology to assist with

communication. She is also working towards having better disease-related research that would support a strong database and lead toward better patient outcomes.

Savine also works very closely with Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, (CHOP) by participating in their support programs; sitting on a parents' panel to provide support to families dealing with a diagnosis of cerebral palsy; and serving on a committee providing feedback to the CHOP administration regarding family experiences and the environment of the hospital, right down to posters on the walls.

Because Tony and Savine not only go above and beyond to provide the best possible care for their son Gabe, they also look to help other families who have loved ones with special medical needs through education and advocacy – they are truly *Champions Among Us.*
